

Yves Sintomer is professor of political science, Paris 8 University, researcher at The Maison française d'Oxford and associate member at Nuffield College, and at the Department of Politics and International Relations (DPIR), Oxford. He has written on participatory and deliberative democracy, political representation, German and French sociology, democracy in a global perspective.

Olivier Bouquet is an Ottoman paleographer, professor of history at the University of Paris Cité and researcher at the Center for Studies in Social Sciences on the African, American and Asian Worlds. His work has focused on administrative elites and great families, as well as on the anthroponymy and punctuation of Ottoman Turkish. His current research focuses on the economic history of the 17th century.

Kostis Smyrlis is associate researcher at the Institute of Historical Research, National Hellenic Research Foundation. Working on the middle and late Byzantine period, his publications focus on the society, economy and state finances and the documents and history of monasteries, especially of Mount Athos.

Suna Çağaptay is an associate professor at Bahçeşehir University, Istanbul. Her research focuses on the "afterlives" of the ancient cities under Christianity and Islam in the eastern Mediterranean. Currently, she is a research fellow with the Impact of the Ancient City project at the University of Cambridge. She is the author of the First Capital of the Ottoman Empire: Bursa (IB Tauris, 2021) and the co-editor for the Cities as Palimpsests?: Responses to Antiquity in Eastern Mediterranean Urbanism (Oxbow, 2022) as well as numerous articles.

Paschalis Androudis is Doctor in Byzantine Archaeology, MA in Conservation Studies, architect and assistant professor in Byzantine Art and Archaeology at the Department of History and Archaeology, Aristotle University of Thessaloniki. His research focuses on Byzantine and Islamic (Seljuk and Ottoman included) art, archaeology and architecture, as well as in heraldry and secular art. He conducted projects of restoration of Byzantine and Ottoman monuments in Greece.
